Perhaps because they've been so long obscure, proto-Color Field paintings by Parker, circa 1959-1963, feel spankingly fresh, relative to contemporaneous Nolands and Olitskis. With brushy vigor, in oils, on largish gessoed canvases, Parker deployed two or more brawny, ragged-edged blocks of dense, mutedly ardent hues. (Off-purples notably impress.) Rothko-like formats deliver color shapes in hardly Rothko-like solid punches. Parker retained New York School scale and excitement while eschewing pathos: Abstract Expressionism without tears.
